



of a greater “family of Berlin.” This is *Berlin’s Time* and with it brings the responsibility of working together to forge a plan that will ensure that our community continues to build on all the cool ways we are working to make our town a special place for residents, workers and growing numbers of guests.

Early this fall, the Mayor and Council will authorize a “strategic planning process” to encourage input from every sector of our community and every neighborhood, so we can thoughtfully and collectively determine both the course of Berlin’s future and to the best of our abilities, our priorities.

We have already successfully started taking on some of the opportunities and challenges we face together. Significant improvements to our infrastructure will continue with the most immediate new benefit coming from the rewards of creating our own municipal stormwater utility. The effort has gotten off to a good start and great funding support from our state and federal partners.

But success has also brought us new challenges. For many years Berlin had a downtown parking problem, too many spaces and not enough vehicles. In just the past five years, or less, this situation has been turned on its head. Not only is there the need for additional parking during our many popular and growing special events, but there are people in town in unprecedented numbers seven days a week from early April through New Year’s Eve.

Our approach will be to methodically examine the options for more parking along two parallel tracks. First, resolving the temporary demand for parking capacity during our 20-plus special events each year will be approached on one level. Through a cooperative effort between the expansive unused parking already available at Berlin schools and places of worship, coupled with a reliable and convenient shuttle service, this will likely be the easier of the two parking challenges to resolve.

To fill the permanent need for daily use parking

that continues throughout at least nine months of the year, will require a bit more creativity. I certainly will never support the demolition or removal of historic buildings in the heart of our community in order to accommodate more motor vehicles, and I don’t think it is even necessary. The town will be exploring multiple options for renting parking on a long-term basis for properties that are currently underused. We also will look at a variety of convenient shuttle service options that could be contracted by the town to automatically adjust to the changes in demand as we go from one season to the next.

Berliners should expect the town to be approached about commercial development along the three major highways that intersect our town: MD 346 (Old Ocean City Blvd.); US 50 (Ocean Gateway) and US 113 (Worcester Highway). Much of the services for town utilities are already in place for these corridors and in some cases we should expect strategic annexations of properties that are immediately contiguous to existing town limits and are also compatible with Berlin’s Comprehensive Plan.

Although our historic downtown is a source of great pride, there still are a handful of buildings in the heart of Berlin that need significant upgrades to the facades. The town will proactively approach these property owners and inform them of the financial grants that are available to help offset the cost of transforming their properties from community eyesores to eye candy.

The Mayor and Council have been besieged in the past couple of years with multiple requests from residents, especially younger families, for a variety of new recreational and entertainment venues and opportunities within town. We are looking forward to the community’s input on the scope of these interests in an effort to determine what priorities to assign to these ideas. You can

also expect continued municipal support for youth programs, not just athletic activities for which Berlin obviously excels, but for endeavors, experiences and community participation in activities and programs that develop character for kids from every neighborhood so they will be prepared to become the next generation of town civic leaders and volunteers in the decades ahead.

The final thing I think you can realistically expect is for the Town of Berlin, or as I prefer to think of it, as our greater "Family of Berlin," is to continue to evolve with changing times. I think our attitude that in Berlin we honor our past, but we don't live in it, has served us very well. It is my hope that this will remain among the bedrock principals we continue to share together as we create the next cool thing in Berlin.

Berlin Electric Department Tests LED Lights



The Berlin Electric Department has recently switched the Victorian streetlamps in front of Town Hall to LED lights. The majority of the Victorian lights in the downtown use 100 watt HDS (high-density sodium) bulbs and the new light is a 27watt LED (light-emitting diode). As seen in the photo below, the old lights (right) provide an off-yellow tint while the LEDs (left) are a bright white and save about 70% energy per fixture.

TOWN OF BERLIN FALL 2014 SPECIAL TRASH & YARD WASTE COLLECTIONS

Please see below for information about what will be collected and what dates apply to your neighborhood.

If your <u>NORMAL TRASH DAY</u> is	then your <u>BULK WASTE PICKUP DAY</u> will be	and your <u>YARD WASTE PICKUP DAY</u> will be

Regular household garbage and recycling is not part of these collections. Collection is for residential properties only; commercial and industrial properties are not included. Items must be at the curb by 6:00 AM; materials placed for pickup at any other time may not be collected.

BULK ITEM COLLECTION

DO:

Include items such as: Furniture - Toilets and Sinks – Carpet – Mattresses - Tables and Chairs – Refrigerators - Washers & Dryers - Small appliances – Televisions – Microwaves – Computer Components.

Small items must be placed in a container at the curb and weigh no more than 100 lbs.

DON'T:

Include items such as: Hazardous Waste - Construction materials – Paint - Yard waste/brush - Propane tanks – Tires – Chemicals - Insecticides.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION

DO:

Place leaves, grass clippings, pine needles and cones, and garden waste in a paper bag, plastic bag, or (maximum) 30 gallon container.

Cut brush into 4 ft. lengths and bundles no larger than 18 inches in diameter.

DON'T:

Mix in stones, rocks, metal, other inorganic matter, dirt, sod or other materials.

2014 Municipal Election Schedule

The Berlin Board of Supervisors of Elections has announced the following schedule for the upcoming Municipal Election for Council seats in Districts 1 and 4 and At-Large.

Absentee Voting: Applications to vote absentee will be available until the following deadlines:

- To apply by mail: Deadline is Tuesday, September 30, 2014. Applications must be received by that date; postmark will NOT be accepted as date of receipt.
- To apply in person at Town Hall: Deadline is 5:00 PM, Friday, October 3, 2014

Absentee Ballots will be accepted up to 7:00 PM on Election Day.

Write-In Candidate Filing: 5:00 PM, Tuesday, September 30, 2014. Filing documents must be received by that date/time; postmark will NOT be accepted as date of receipt. Note: Write-In candidates will not appear on printed ballots.

Election Day: Tuesday, October 7, 2014, 7:00 AM-7:00 PM.

Polling Places:

Districts 1 & 2 Voters: Buckingham Presbyterian Church, 20 S. Main Street.

Districts 3 & 4: Multi-Purpose Building on Flower Street, next to the Head Start Center.

Help Improve Water Quality!

Stormwater management plays an important role in the improvement of water quality in local area waterways. Our stormwater system consists of storm drains, storm pipes, ditches and stormwater ponds. Rainwater that enters the local stormwater system eventually makes its way to local waterways and remains largely untreated, carrying excess nutrients and pollutants to waterways.

By reducing contamination and pollution entering storm drains, we can decrease the ecological and economic impacts to local waterways, including the adverse effect to fish and wildlife. Regular maintenance to the stormwater system can also reduce flooding and the potential for property damage and erosion, this includes clearing debris from storm drains and catch basins. There are many sources of contamination, some that you may encounter daily without a second thought. Among them are pesticides, fertilizer, dog waste, garbage, leaves, grass clippings and other yard waste. Even the runoff from washing your vehicle is a damaging source of pollution.

While improving the health of our environment is a large-scale obstacle to overcome, there are many ways that you can help! Keeping yard waste cleaned up is a major way to prevent runoff from washing debris and waste into the roadway and clogging storm drains. You can also help reduce runoff by using rain barrels and rain gardens to capture rainwater as well as pervious pavers in lieu of pavement to allow infiltration of rainwater. Likewise, cleaning up after our dogs and using environmentally friendly products for washing your car, fertilizing your yard will keep excess nutrients and pollution out of our local waterways.

DELMARVA POWER PROJECT TO BENEFIT WORCESTER COUNTY

Delmarva Power will hold a community meeting at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 16 at Ocean City Volunteer Fire Company – Station 5 at 10124 Keyser Point Road to provide details on its plan to rebuild a more than 50 year old electric transmission line between Berlin and Ocean City.

The approximately \$43 million project to rebuild the existing nine-mile, 69,000-volt transmission line is scheduled to begin in October of this year and is intended to increase electric system capacity to handle customer load growth and improve overall area electric reliability.

The project involves the replacement of approximately 150, 45- to 60-foot tall wooden poles with 80- to 90-foot tall steel poles that are more durable, require less maintenance and can withstand hurricane force winds of 120 miles per hour.

Work also will entail the installation of a new underwater cable under Isle of Wight Bay between West Ocean City and downtown Ocean City at 2nd Street bayside.

The rebuild of the overhead line is targeted for completion by May 2015, with the underwater section scheduled to be finished by May 2016.

“This work will enhance electric service reliability in Worcester County and ensure that we can continue to meet our customers’ energy needs,” said John Allen, Delmarva Power Region Vice President. “This project is one of numerous infrastructure improvements planned throughout our service territory over the next several years.”
