6. Public Hearing – Resolution 2014-06 Annexation Agreement

Mayor Williams opened the Public Hearing regarding Resolution 2014-06 Seahawk Road Annexation. He asked if representatives of the State or County were present to comment. Hearing none, the hearing was opened to the general public.

Mark Cropper, representative for Blair Rinnier (Principal) introduced Wes Guckert from The Traffic Group and Brock Parker of Parker Engineers. Mr. Cropper turned presentation over to his client, Blair Rinnier who described the proposed and envisioned project. A 144- apartment complex, growing to over 785 units (15-20) years from now; the construction rate would be 30-60 apartment homes per year.

Comments:

Trish Dufendach -of Berlin, asked questions about ‘bike-able’ Berlin; discussion followed regarding the difficulty of connectivity to the rest of the Town as certain nearby areas are not within the Town limits. Ms. Dufendach, asked if there would be a stated provided crosswalk or guard. Mr. Rinnier agreed to absorb all expenses related to the crossing guard and crosswalk.

Vererna Chase – Asked how the calculation of the number of additional school children in a two-three bedroom home was made; Mr. Rinnier responded that the number was based on a two to three bedroom floor plan that more than one child in a home, space would be tight.

Gregory Purnell –Asked about improvements along Seahawks from Rt. 50 to Flower Street. Planning Director Dave Engelhart, said yes sidewalks will run the length of Seahawk. Mr. Purnell also asked will sidewalks be down Flower Street? The Mayor stated that particular property was not in the Town Limits; also, the water and sewer were an issue.

Ron Casio – Stated that the land the park would be built on will be given to the Town. That people will be slow to obey traffic of no left turn out of development.

Gabe Purnell – Mr. Purnell asked about a service road. Attorney Mark Cropper stated that it wasn’t commercial property so there would be no need, it would be a County issue.

Steve Farr- Mr. Farr stated that the entire process felt rushed.

At this point Councilmember Gulyas asked the top three benefits to the Town. Mr. Rinnier noted there would be quality and affordable housing. There would be the tax revenue, impact fees and EDU’s. The

last noted benefit was the improvement to Seahawk Road. Mr. Rinnier also stated there would be on-site management twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, three-hundred sixty five days a year. The office would be open 8:30-6pm including Saturdays. Rinnier Development is currently using a security-check software that checks prospective tenants; it has been used during the past 18 months.

A question was raised regarding the annexation agreement. It said, "with limitations." Mr. Cropper and Mr. Rinnier agreed to fix that error.

Mr. Cropper noted this is an annexation and zoning hearing for an R4 development, not a site plan.

Councilmember Brittingham asked if this will become a subsidized housing project. Mr. Rinnier stated the answer was no, and the only Rinnier Property that is subsidized is in Fruitland, 10 units out of 1200, from 30 years ago.

Councilmember Hall, expressed concern that you've got to go out of Berlin, to get to Berlin.

The Public Hearing was closed at 9:05pm; the annexation agreement was modified as follows:

- A. Recital F, with limitation, becomes without limitation.
- B. Include crossing guard, if needed, at developer's expense.
- C. Increase park acreage from one-half acre to one acre.

9. Department Reports

- a. Finance** – Ms. Saleh reported that each department is working on FY16 budgets.
- b. Deputy Administrator** – Ms. Bohlen reported that Park Clean-Up Day was 4/4/15 and Town Clean-Up Day was 4/11/15. Ms. Bohlen said there would be lots of announcements and information going out on both those events.
- c. Water Resources and Public Works** – Ms. Kreiter, announced that crews had been reading meters. Saturday April 28, 2015 there will be a tour of the Wastewater Treatment plant for Coastal Kids. Councilmember Burrell inquired how pothole repair was progressing; Ms. Kreiter stated that the department has been through two pallets of perma-patch. There are some streets such as Showell Street and Flower Street that are on their second round of repairs from this winter only. Councilmember Burrell asked about a piece of equipment purchased to repair cracks, Ms. Kreiter said that particular piece of equipment was more effective in warmer weather.
- d. Electric** – Mr. Lawrence reported that the Department has been trimming trees. A complimentary energy audit was conducted at 9928 Commerce Street. The department replaced a rotten pole at 232 West Street.
- e. Police** – No updates to report
- f. Planning** - Nothing major to report, with the exceptions of the large things in the Department, the Resolution of Seahawk Road Annexation and the resolution of the Public Works agreement with Cannery Village. Both items have been long running projects and Mr. Engelhart appreciated the cooperation between departments. Permits could be issued as soon as April 1, 2015 for Cannery Village. Councilmember Burrell inquired where we were with the Dollar General Store; at this point, the official decision has not been made. Mr. Engelhart believes anticipating his decision they may be taking the next legal step. Mr. Engelhart was asked to follow-up as to what the next process would be.
- g. Human Resources** – No updates to report. Councilmember Burrell did asked to be kept up to date on Health Insurance progress for the upcoming year.
- h. Economic Development:** Ms. Wells was pleased to announce that a MML Achievement Award has just been received and the presentation would be at MML June. Ms. Wells also

reported that the former Boomers location had been leased to a business, Crush and Crab, with a scheduled opening of June 1, 2015. Ms. Well's upcoming schedule include trips to Maryland Main Street on the Western Shore and National Main Street in Atlanta, GA.


Councilmember Hall, again complimented the Town's staff – including department heads and other council members. The amount of work and care that goes into The Town shows pride in a job well done.

Resolution 2015-04

WHEREAS, tax-exempt municipal bonds are the primary means by which state and local governments finance three quarters of the critical infrastructure of our nation, including roads, bridges, hospitals, schools, and utility systems; and

WHEREAS, through the tax exemption, the federal government continues to provide critical support for the federal, state and local partnership that develops and maintains essential infrastructure, which it cannot practically replicate by other means; and

WHEREAS, the municipal tax exemption has enabled state and local governments to finance more than \$1.65 trillion in infrastructure investment over the last decade; and

WHEREAS, this tax exemption is part of a more than century-long system of reciprocal immunity under which owners of federal bonds are, in turn, not required to pay state and local income tax on the interest they receive from federal bonds; and

WHEREAS, municipalities benefit from this tax exemption through substantial savings on the interest cost of borrowed money; and

WHEREAS, tax exempt bonds benefit state and local governments who need the support of investors to finance critical infrastructure, taxpayers across the country who depend on this infrastructure for reliable transportation systems, schools, public health facilities, energy, clean water and affordable housing, the federal government, who gets quite a bargain on their partnership with state and local government to provide the nation's infrastructure through the exemption; and investors who buy bonds for many reasons, including the safe nature of these financial products; and

WHEREAS, municipal bonds are the second safest investment, aside from U.S. Treasuries, with state and local governments having nearly a zero default rate; and

WHEREAS, 72.4 percent of the total outstanding municipal debt is held by individual investors, either directly or through mutual funds and money market funds (Source - 2010 Thomson Reuters); and
WHEREAS, Congress and the President have proposed legislation to reduce or repeal the tax exemption on municipal bonds; and

WHEREAS, these proposals to reduce or repeal the tax exemption would have severely detrimental impacts on national infrastructure development and the municipal market, raising costs for state and local borrowers and creating uncertainty for investors; and

WHEREAS, if the proposal to cap the exemption on municipal bonds at 28 percent had been in place over the last 10 years it would have cost state and local governments an additional \$173 billion in interest costs; and

WHEREAS, total repeal of the exemption over the last decade would have cost state and local governments over \$495 billion in additional interest costs; and

WHEREAS, the municipal tax exemption has a long history of success, having been maintained through two world wars and the Great Depression, as well as the recent Great Recession, and it continues to finance the majority of our nation's infrastructure needs for state and local governments of all sizes when no other source exists to do so;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town of Berlin opposes any efforts by Congress and the White House to reduce or repeal the federal tax exemption on interest earned from municipal bonds; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we oppose any action that would reduce or repeal the exemption on tax-exempt bond interest, and affirm that there should be no legislative action to apply any changes retroactively to current outstanding bonds; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution shall be sent to our Congressional Representatives and key members of the Administration.
