MINUTES – PARKS COMMISSION
April 7, 2015

A meeting of the Berlin Parks Commission was held on Tuesday, April 7, 2015 at 5:30 PM. Commission members Loretta Briddell, Patricia Dufendach, Sarah Hooper, Bruce Hyder and Mike Wiley were present as well as Deputy Town Administrator Mary Bohlen. Councilmember Lisa Hall, Town Administrator Laura Allen, Public Works Director Jane Kreiter and Economic Development Director Ivy Wells were also present as well as Youth Coordinator Maria Cusimano.

The Commission reviewed the Minutes of March 3, 2015. Mr. Wiley moved to approve the Minutes as written and approval was unanimous.

Ms. Bohlen asked everyone to introduce themselves to Ms. Cusimano, who had replaced Melanie Windsor at Worcester Youth and Family Counseling.

Discussion followed regarding Clean-Up Day, which was scheduled for the following Saturday, April 11th. Ms. Kreiter provided drawings of the horseshoe pits planned for installation and general discussion about Clean-Up Day followed.

Mike Wiley and Ms. Kreiter planned to meet at Stephen Decatur Park to discuss the meadow area by the Nature Trail.

The group reviewed upcoming event dates including Cool Berlin Day, which the Parks Commission had decided to participate in as they were not able to participate in the Spring Celebration due to high winds. Ms. Bohlen noted that dates had been set for outdoor movies in both Stephen Decatur and Henry Parks.

Ms. Cusimano reported on recent and upcoming activities for the Berlin Youth Club. WYFC was working with Ms. Wells to establish a way to make watering flowers downtown more accessible; the idea was to establish rain barrels at buildings throughout the downtown and provide watering cans decorated by the children at each can to encourage anyone to water flowers.

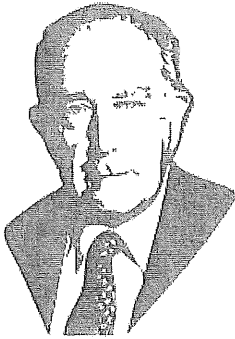
Discussion continued. Ms. Wells asked about concerts in the park. Discussion followed regarding the Parks Commission's desire to see more events held in the parks.

MIKE AND HELEN WILEY

After retiring nearly a decade ago, Mike and Helen Wiley settled down in Berlin and quickly became fixtures in the community. When a local thrift shop run by St. Paul's Episcopal Church, The Church Mouse, was in danger of closing, the Wileys stepped in and were instrumental in helping keep the doors open. Staffed entirely by about a dozen volunteers, Helen works about 30-35 hours a week at the thrift shop which has served the community for more than 50 years.

The Wileys also participate in the Berlin Main Street Ambassador Program, staffing a kiosk during the summer months distributing maps, informational materials and answering questions from tourists. Helen chairs the Main Street Design Committee and helped raise funds for the downtown business district's Victorian Christmas display.

Mike is Berlin's official 'sign poet,' coming up with unique phrases for the sign board on U.S.

50 to attract people to events and the downtown area. He is also chairman of the town's parks commission and as a volunteer with the Berlin Chamber of Commerce, helps set up events like the Fiddlers Convention and Berlin Christmas Parade.

Before moving to the Eastern Shore, the Wileys lived in Annapolis where Helen was a sign language interpreter for Anne Arundel County Schools and Mike, who is a Vietnam War veteran, was a career firefighter with Anne Arundel County.

The couple was nominated by Berlin Mayor Gee Williams who says, "Although retired, the Wileys both literally work full-time as free volunteers for our community. Their contributions of hours, ideas and inspiration to others to become involved in serving Berlin are priceless."

Williams calls the Wileys, "Berlin's Coolest Couple in America's Coolest Small Town."

each movie costs \$894 to show. the price is dependent on the size of the screen. the cost of license to show publicly to x amount of people is also included in the package price. if you go to funflicks.com you can see the different packages that are available, minus taxes. there was another movie company that was slightly cheaper but they were pretty booked for this spring already. our package includes a 30' screen and sound for 150-300 people. I feel like these 3 movies are a trial run, once we see how they are accepted, I would suggest looking into purchasing our own equipment. I spoke to kate gaddis at oc rec dept and they purchased their equipment a few years back and have since replaced an inflatable screen and the cost was around \$10,000 (including replacement) I will try to find original email from kate to give you accurate prices. I have looked into a couple grants that are available that would cover most of purchase cost.

the pros to renting is the company delivers, sets up, plays movie and disassembles. we supply the dvd to be shown, and they bring a back up copy.

DR. WILLIAM E. HENRY

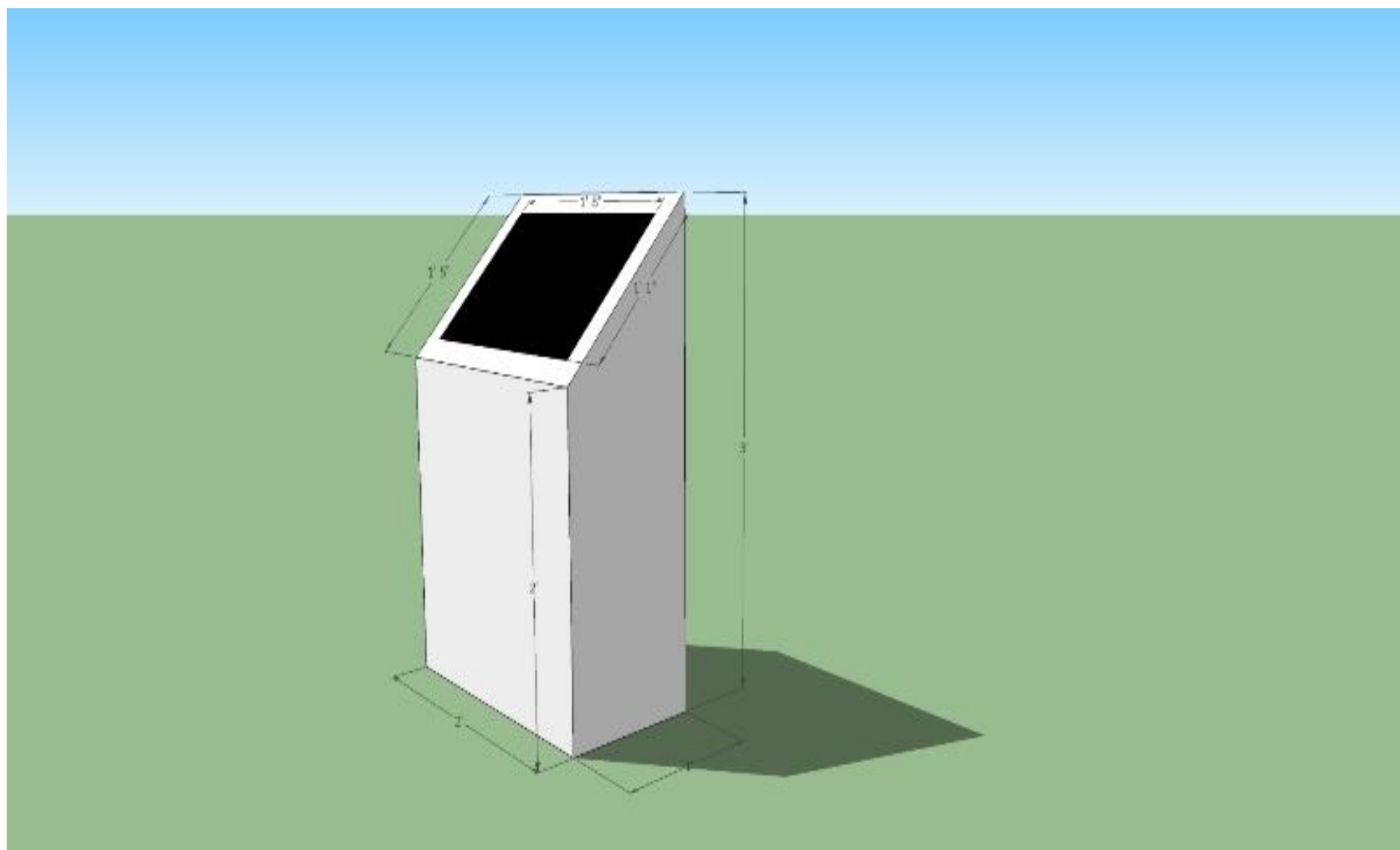
The son of Edward and Mary Henry, he was born and raised in Snow Hill, Maryland and received his early education in Worcester County. He devoted his life to educating young people, serving in all levels of education; he was an elementary teacher, college teacher and supervisor of schools in Worcester County. His career spanned from 1924 to 1967 and included teaching elementary school in North Carolina to being named President of Bowie State Teachers College (now Bowie State University) from 1942 to 1967 – the longest tenure for that office. He returned to Worcester County for a decade when he was appointed supervisor of county schools from 1932 to 1942. During his career he organized several teacher education programs and served as a professor and chairman of education departments throughout Maryland.

He was married to Mary Holy Henry and they had two sons and a daughter.

The dedication of this park honors and remembers his contribution to education in Worcester County and the state of Maryland.

Berlin Plans Ribbon Cutting for US 113 Countdown Crosswalk Signal

Community appreciation event to be held at Henry Park, Friday May 8th

(April 27, 2015) --- The Town of Berlin has scheduled a ribbon cutting for the new countdown crosswalk signal recently installed at the intersection of Bay St. extended and Route 113 on Friday, May 8, at 11 a.m., Mayor Gee Williams announced. The public is invited to join the event.

“We are gathering at Henry Park on Flower Street and walking over to the intersection for a brief ceremony to mark the completion of the project,” said Mayor Williams. “This is an example of something good that will permanently benefit the community coming out of a terrible tragedy,” he added.

Patricia Dufendach, Chairperson of the Berlin Pedestrian Safety Committee, led the community effort to get the countdown crosswalk in place. “This really was a communitywide effort. We had over 1,000 signatures on our petition, which shows you we had broad support for getting crosswalk improvements at that intersection,” stated Dufendach.

“The community stood together.” Dufendach added, “I want to thank the State Highway Administration for their help and guidance through this process. We received a high level of professional attention from them. They took the time to understand the problem and found the money to get a solution in place,” she said.
