Present: Mayor Gee Williams, Vice-President Elroy Brittingham, Councilmembers Thom Gulyas, Zackery Tyndall, Dean Burrell, and Troy Purnell.

Following the Lord's Prayer and Pledge of Allegiance, Mayor Williams called the meeting to order at approximately 7:00 PM.

2. Presentation – Arts and Entertainment Updates – Secretary Stephanie Fowler and Vice-President Robin Tomaselli

Ms. Fowler presented A&E information from 2017. Ms. Tomaselli presented plans for 2018. Councilmember Tyndall expressed his interest in the planter boxes; Ms. Tomaselli said she also liked them and felt they were safer for pedestrians, but other businesses prefer their sandwich boards. Mayor Williams stated that eventually the other businesses in town may see the benefits of the planter boxes over the sandwich boards.

- 3. Berlin Heritage Foundation Events Committee Member Carol Rose
 - a. One Day Alcohol Permit for Afternoon on the Lawn June 10th
 - b. Request to serve alcohol at the Business After Hours April 26th

Ms. Rose presented information about both events and requested permission to serve alcohol at the events.

Councilmember Gulyas stated that he supports the organization, but not the alcohol aspect.

4. Presentation – Hope 4 Recovery Inc. request for support of group home.

Executive Director Patrice Hamilton-Ottey, President Sarah Hooper, and Vice-President Tracy Simpson presented information on behalf of Hope 4 Recovery. Councilmember Tyndall asked if this was an all-male home; Ms. Ottey said it was. The City of Salisbury's Housing and Homelessness Manager Theo Williams presented information on how the house came to be in Salisbury. Councilmember Tyndall mentioned that he attended a workshop that Mr. Williams did through MML and asked if he could do another. Bryan Zimmerman a resident of the home in Salisbury shared his experience in the home. Councilmember Burrell asked if the home in Salisbury is run by the organization or Ms. Ottey as an individual; Ms. Ottey said she runs that home on her own, but the Berlin home would be run by Hope 4 Recovery. Councilmember Burrell also asked how many board members lived in Berlin; she stated four. Councilmember Gulyas asked if they had the support of the Board of Education (BOE); Ms. Ottey said she does verbally, but their only concern is during arrival and dismissal, but she would make a house rule that they cannot go outside during that time. They will be giving the same presentation to the BOE on March 20th and will hopefully have their support in writing. Vice-President Brittingham expressed concerns about the number of vehicles on the property; Ms. Ottey said they are taking out the shed and pool which will create parking in the backyard. Vice-President Brittingham asked if the property backs up to the school; Ms. Ottey said there is a vacant lot for sale in between the two.

Mayor Williams stated that the decision would be up to the Board of Appeals (BZA), and they would need to present the information to them, but strongly suggested Hope 4 Recovery get a letter of support from the BOE for their meeting with the BZA. Ms. Hooper requested that the Council waive the BZA application fee of \$325. Councilmember Burrell asked if their non-profit status is pending and they stated it was, they submitted it back in November and are waiting to hear back. Town Administrator Laura Allen asked if there would be any issue with waiving the fee without notice; Town Attorney David Gaskill said there would not. Councilmember's Tyndall and

Purnell said they would prefer they pay the fee and request reimbursement once they are a certified non-profit. Councilmember Burrell asked if there were any community members or neighbors that would like to address the Council on this matter. Citizen Carol Rose asked if neighbors were even notified; Ms. Ottey said not yet. Ms. Simpson said it was their intention to do that closer to the BZA meeting. Planning and Zoning Director David Engelhart stated that they will post the property once it comes before BZA, but it will need to run in the papers twice and the deadline is approaching if they want to be on the April 4th agenda. Mayor Williams suggests they speak with the neighbors soon to show good faith and keep the community involved. Councilmember's Purnell and Tyndall, and Vice-President Brittingham stated that they support the program but want to hear from the residents and the BOE. Mayor Williams stated that he thinks support is unanimous, but it is ultimately up to BZA. He suggested they not rush through the process and take time to do things the proper way.

5. Departmental Reports:

a. Finance Director – Natalie Saleh

Ms. Saleh reported that she and Ms. Allen will be attending a conference in Chicago on Monday and Tuesday to assist in developing a pilot program for financial sustainability. She stated that April 16th will be the first budget workshop and until then she will continue to work on the budget and meet with departments. They are also working on net metering for solar power.

b. Administrative Services Director - Mary Bohlen

Ms. Bohlen stated that the preconstruction meeting for the tennis courts was last week. The notice to proceed will be issued on March 19th and the contract completion date is June 17th.

c. Electric Utility Director – Tim Lawrence

Mr. Lawrence reported that there was an outage on March 2nd due to trees on the power lines by the ice plant, and they had everyone back on within two hours. They topped all the trees in that area to prevent that from occurring again. On Germantown Road a house was demolished, and they removed the service and meter. On 115 Flower they replaced and relocated the service. Pulte Homes has decided to pay for lights to be installed on Schooner Lane and Intrepid Lane. The Electric Department removed trees at the tennis courts. Councilmember Burrell asked for a map of the circuits in town for outages; Mr. Lawrence will send it out. He then reported that he'd eventually like to install a second substation at Berlin Falls Park, but it is costly and complicated.

Vice-President Brittingham asked if the light on the tower has been addressed. Town Administrator Laura Allen stated that the County gave her contact information and they individual has not called back, so she will have Town Attorney David Gaskill intervene. The company that will not call back is American Tower- Erin Rumley 781-926-4583.

d. Planning and Zoning Director – David Engelhart

Mr. Engelhart attended the Walkshop today and said they will be giving recommendations and feedback on the program.

e. Police Chief – Arnold Downing

Chief Downing has been in contact with the BOE and AGH regarding safety concerns and will continue to work with them. They will perform threat assessments for the organizations. He has also provided active shooter training to local churches.

f. Managing Director – Jeffrey Fleetwood

Mr. Fleetwood said during the storm on March 2nd there was damage to the roof tiles of the drying beds at Wastewater and we will need to replace 90% of the tiles, but we will be responsible for

our deductible. March 23rd will be the employee recognition gathering. Lastly, he asked that everyone keep Public Works Superintendent Wendell Purnell in their prayers.

6. Town Administrator's Report – Laura Allen

Ms. Allen reported that there was a write up about the Town in Shore Magazine and it was very positive. They installed a new billboard on route 50. Baker Street has been held up because of the weather, but they are hoping to pave it next week. The Worcester CARES event is an assistance fair for County residents. It will be on April 14th from 10am-3pm. Councilmember Tyndall stated that we should include Wor-Wic, and citizen Carol Rose suggested including veteran services. Mr. Fleetwood stated that the Town is holding a food drive in Town Hall until April 12th.

7. Comments from the Mayor – none.

8. Comments from the Council:

Councilmember Burrell asked if the Town had any plans yet for the old police department space at this time; Ms. Allen stated that we are working on it, and will present it to the Council when that time comes.

9. Comments from the Audience

Carol Rose asked if anyone has contacted her friend that fell in Henry's Mill. Mr. Fleetwood stated that he reached out to her twice and left a voicemail stating that it is up to the Homeowners Association to fix their sidewalks. Mr. Engelhart said it is up to the property owner; he said the owner is aware and said he purchased the home with the sidewalks in that condition.

Ali Giska presented information on Tinkergarten and requested permission to use the parks for her event. Ms. Bohlen explained that she presented the information to the Parks Commission and while they liked the idea of the program, they advised her that for-profit organizations are not usually granted permission to use the parks for a profit. Councilmember Tyndall asked if she tried to partner with any non-profits; she said she has not. Ms. Allen asked what the rate would be; she said \$17 per class and there would be eight sessions for each season. Councilmember Burrell expressed that he thinks the event is great, but does not want someone making income off of tax payer's property. Mayor Williams and Councilmember Burrell stated that it is a great premise, but creates a messy situation for other similar requests. Councilmember Tyndall asked why Jeep Week was able to have a for profit course there; Mayor Williams stated that it was a part of the deal when they purchased the property and the additional year was verbally agreed upon. Councilmember Gulyas asked Ms. Allen to share some non-profit organizations information that may be interested in partnering up; she said she will and did mention some already to Ms. Giska.

ELECTRIC SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS ELECTRIC SERVICE AGREEMENT, entered into this 15° day of _______ day of _______ day of _______ 2018, by and between the Mayor and Council of the Town of Berlin (Service Provider), and Sonrise Church (Customer).

WHEREAS Customer is the owner of real property located at Route 818 and Route 50 in Berlin, Maryland and being more particularly designated as Map 0025, Parcel 0050; and

WHEREAS Customer acknowledges that said real property is contained in Service Provider's electric service territory pursuant to Maryland Public Service Commission (MPSC) Order No. 77826, Case 8800; and

WHEREAS Customer recognizes Service Provider's exclusive right to provide electric service to Customer's real property; and

WHEREAS Customer's real property is currently being provided electric service by Delmarva Power, and Customer recognizes that it is legally required to switch equipment and service to Service Provider; and

WHEREAS Customer has requested that Service Provider grant it a delay in switching over to equipment and service provided by Service Provider.

NOW THEREFORE, it is agreed by the Parties hereto as follows:

- 1. Service Provider agrees that Customer may delay purchasing equipment and service from Service Provider until November 1, 2018.
- 2. Customer agrees that it has been advised that its current electric equipment provided by Delmarva Power is old and may fail.
- 3. Customer agrees that in the event it sub-divides its property, those sub-divided parcels shall remain in Service Provider's electric service territory.
- 4. The Parties agree that this Agreement may be extended by mutual written agreement of the Parties hereto.

Public Safety Mutual Aid Agreement

AUTHORITY

THIS AGREEMENT is subject to and is entered into pursuant to Section 2-105 of the Criminal Procedural Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the County Commissioners of Worcester County, Maryland along with the Sheriff of Worcester County are authorized to enter into Mutual Aid Agreements with municipal corporations, counties and other governing agencies or jurisdictions to provide for public and governmental purposes and further pursuant to Subtitle 1 of Title 7 of the Public Safety Article of the Code of Public Local Laws of Worcester County, Maryland.

PARTIES

Parties to this Agreement shall be County Commissioners of Worcester County, Maryland hereinafter called "**Commissioners**", the Worcester County Sheriff hereinafter called "**Sheriff**", and the Mayor and Council of the Town of Berlin hereinafter called "**Berlin**"; and

In order to be binding and effective, this Agreement must be approved by endorsement hereon by the County Commissioners of Worcester County, the Sheriff of Worcester County and the government agency named above.

AGREEMENT

Parties hereto, in consideration of the premises, the mutual promises herein contained and pursuant to the statutory references hereinbefore stated do hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Mutual Aid Agreement</u>. This document shall memorialize agreements between the Parties and constitute a Mutual Aid Agreement adopted pursuant to the statutory references set forth above.
- 2. **Definition.**

"Public Safety Officer", as used herein, shall mean law enforcement officers, including police officers and all other officers, agents, or employees of the Parties hereto as contemplated the statutes referenced above.

- 3. <u>Powers of Sheriff</u>. The Sheriff and deputies of the Sheriff's Office are Public Safety Officers of Worcester County, Maryland and have full and complete police powers, pursuant to law, and pursuant to the Constitution of Maryland throughout Worcester County, including areas within the corporate limits of the municipalities of Worcester County and limited only, if at all, in areas owned by the State of Maryland, the United States Government, or any foreign country or embassy.
- 4. <u>Authority in County</u>. The Sheriff is the Chief Law Enforcement Officer of Worcester County and shall have the right to control all operations taking place outside the corporate limits of Berlin, provided, however, that this shall in no way limit the Sheriff's authority in Worcester County.
- 5. <u>Powers</u>. As set forth herein and in accordance with circumstances herein after set forth, Public Safety Officers of Berlin are authorized to exercise all of powers and authority, to which the Berlin Police Department is empowered within the corporate limits of the Berlin, outside of the corporate limits of said area but within Worcester County, Maryland in the following cases:
 - A. At such time as a Public Safety Officer of Berlin observes a violation of the criminal or motor vehicle laws within the corporate limits of Berlin and it becomes necessary to pursue the offender outside of the corporate limits, but within Worcester County to prevent the offender's escape, or to apprehend, arrest and detain such offender or to transport such offender into the corporate limits of Berlin;
 - B. While conducting an investigation into a crime which has been alleged to have occurred within the corporate limits of Berlin and it becomes necessary to continue such investigation outside of the corporate limits of Berlin, but within Worcester County, and to apprehend, arrest and detain such offender, and to transport such offender back into the corporate limits of Berlin provided the offender is charged with a felony, or in addition, whenever a warrant has been issued for the offender's arrest;

- C. While attached to any multi-agency unit, task force, or when at the request of the Sheriff-participating in any joint assignment, effort, operation, check point, surveillance or other exercise which includes at least one member of the Sheriff's Office;
- D. When requested by the Sheriff pursuant to this Agreement; or
- E. At any time, in any instance covered by *State Law* or provided for in this Agreement.
- 6. <u>Reciprocity</u>. Public Safety Officers of Worcester County are authorized to exercise all of powers and authority, to which they are empowered within the corporate limits of Worcester County, within Berlin in the following cases:
 - A. At such time as a Public Safety Officer of Worcester County observes a violation of the criminal or motor vehicle laws within the County and it becomes necessary to pursue the offender inside of the corporate limits of Berlin to prevent the offender's escape, or to apprehend, arrest and detain such offender or to transport such offender;
 - B. While conducting an investigation into a crime which has been alleged to have occurred within Worcester County and it becomes necessary to continue such investigation inside the corporate limits of Berlin, and to apprehend, arrest and detain such offender, and to transport such offender back outside the corporate limits of Berlin, provided the offender is charged with a felony, or in addition, whenever a warrant has been issued for the offender's arrest;
 - C. While attached to any multi-agency unit, task force or, when at the request of the Sheriff participating in any joint assignment, effort, operation, check point, surveillance or other exercise which includes at least one member of the Sheriff's Office;
 - D. When requested by Berlin Chief of Police pursuant to this Agreement; or
 - E. At any time, in any instance covered by State Law or provided for in this Agreement.

- 7. Witness to Crime. A Public Safety Officer of Worcester County and Berlin will not undertake routine patrol or police duties outside the limits of its jurisdiction, except as specified within this Agreement. However, Public Safety Officers within the Berlin may exercise full police authority outside the corporate limits of the Berlin whenever they witness a crime, or in any extraordinary or emergency situation outside the limits of the Berlin but within Worcester County, Maryland. Public Safety Officers of Worcester County may do the same within Berlin.
- 8. <u>Equipment</u>. When mutual aid is requested and authorized hereby it may include the utilization of all necessary equipment.
- 9. <u>**Request.</u>** A request for assistance for mutual aid may be made by the the Mayor and Council of the Town of Berlin or the Chief Public Safety Officer of the Berlin or by the Sheriff or a Sheriff's Deputy either formally or informally and need not be made in writing. A record of the request, shall, however, be made in writing, either coincidental with the request or subsequent thereto which shall include the time of the request and the extent of the aid requested. If in the judgment of the Sheriff or Chief Public Safety Official, resources are needed and available, they may be dispatched. The requesting agency will identify when and where the resources need to report.</u>
- 10. Waiver. Each of the Parties waives any and all claims that are against the other party to the Agreement that may arise out of their activities outside their respective jurisdictions under the provisions of this Agreement.
- 11. <u>Indemnity</u>. The Parties each indemnify and hold harmless the other party from any and all claims including those for worker's compensation as well as claims by third parties including those for property damage or personal injury or wrongful death and that may arise out of the activities of the other party to this Agreement outside their respective jurisdictions pursuant to this Agreement, to the extent permitted by law. The Parties will cooperate fully with the other in defense of claims to include: immediate notification to the other party of any accident resulting in personal injury, damage or having the potential for liability.

- 12. Immunities. Whenever any Public Safety Officer / employee is acting in another jurisdiction pursuant to a request for assistance under this Agreement, that Public Safety Officer / employee shall have all of the authority, immunities from liability and exemptions from laws, ordinances and regulations and that Public Safety Officer's/employee's employing jurisdiction shall continue to provide all of the pension, relief, disability, workers' compensation, and other benefits enjoyed by such Public Safety Officer/ employee to the same extent as if such officer or officers / employees were performing his or her respective duties within his or her employing jurisdiction. Nothing herein constitutes a waiver of any immunities or limitations of liability as may exist in law.
- 13. <u>Insurance</u>. Each of the Parties hereto shall obtain liability insurance with such companies and in such amounts as may be satisfactorily to the other party and which said insurance shall be extended to cover all claims arising out of this Agreement. Self- insurance or pooled insurance may satisfy this requirement. Each of the Parties shall provide for workers compensation insurance and officer's benefits to be provided by the respective employers at all times.
- 14. <u>Costs</u>. Each jurisdictions' direct and actual operational shall be borne by that jurisdiction unless some other written agreement is executed by the Parties.
- 15. <u>Not Joint Employees</u>. Public Safety Officers engaged in Mutual Aid pursuant to this Agreement or otherwise, shall not be considered joint employees of the other jurisdiction for any purpose.
- 16. <u>Control</u>. In cases where aid is requested by the Sheriff, control of the operation for which the aid is requested shall be vested in the Sheriff or in such Public Safety Officer as the Sheriff may designate and to whom such control is delegated.
- 17. <u>Time Period</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon both Parties for a period of one (1) year from the date hereof and shall be automatically renewed each succeeding year. This Agreement may be terminated upon the giving of thirty

(30) days written notice by either party. This Agreement will be reviewed annually by the Parties.

- 18. <u>Limited to County Boundaries</u>. This Agreement shall be effective only within the boundaries of Worcester County.
- 19. <u>No Limitation</u>. Nothing herein shall limit the power, authority or duties of the Sheriff or any Deputy Sheriff or other powers of law enforcement officers pursuant to law including, without limitation, fresh pursuit.
- 20. **Disputes**. If any dispute or issue arises under this Agreement, the Parties agree to resolve the issue at the lowest management level of each party. In the event the issue remains unresolved, the Parties agree to immediately escalate the issue to upper-level management (County/Municipality administrative directors) for their consideration. In all events, the Parties will negotiate, in good faith, a mutually agreeable solution. In the event all Parties cannot agree on a solution, the issue shall be directed to the Worcester County Commissioners and Mayor and Council of the Town of Berlin.

TOWN OF BERLIN FY2019 Proposed Program Open Space Projects Eight Visions Consistency Statement March 20, 2018

DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS:

1. STEPHEN DECATUR PARK: Stephen Decatur Park is a general use park featuring playground equipment, tennis courts, a pavilion and a rubberized walking path, as well as a Nature Trail and Pond. There are two projects proposed for Stephen Decatur Park (number indicates priority placement in the overall POS Annual Program for Development for FY19):

1. Pre-fabricated Restroom: The Town currently has a pending application for funding through Community Parks and Playgrounds for the purchase and installation of a pre-fabricated, permanent restroom for Stephen Decatur Park. Notification of award status is not expected until late summer.

5. Expansion of the Tot-Lot: This expansion will include increased square footage to allow for more picnic facilities and improved access particularly for strollers and wheelchairs.

- 2. DR. WILLIAM HENRY PARK: Henry Park is a general use park featuring playground equipment, basketball courts, horseshoe pits and a pavilion. The courts were completely replaced in 2015 with funding from both Program Open Space and Community Parks and Playgrounds. At that time, public feedback indicated that lighting, which would permit the use of the basketball courts after sundown, was not desired. However, recent citizen and elected official comments prompted the Town to re-visit providing lighting and a survey of every property immediately around the park was conducted to determine the extent of public support from those who would be most impacted; the overwhelming majority of respondents indicated that they were in support of lighting the courts. This project is the second overall priority for the FY18 Development plan.
- 3. BERLIN FALLS PARK: In 2016 Berlin purchased the former Tyson Chicken Processing Plant on Old Ocean City Boulevard. The plant and land occupy approximately 60 acres and include several buildings, structures such as wells and in-ground tanks, and two lagoons. This property was purchased specifically for the purpose of development into a new park for our residents and visitors, and the Town has worked with a consultant to develop several concepts for its ultimate design. Prior to purchasing the property, the Town had Phase I and II Environmental studies conducted, which identified several environmental issues, none of which are considered an impediment to development. The Town has applied to the Voluntary Clean-Up program managed by the Maryland Department of the Environment to change the approved use from industrial to recreational and has enlisted the assistance of the Thriving Earth Exchange, which

provides scientists on a pro-bono basis, to identify and plan specific environmental remediation. The Town has secured the areas of the property that pose safety hazards, placed signage required by the Town's insurance carrier and the Voluntary Clean-Up program and generally tidied-up the property with the intent of allowing passive use – walking, dog-walking, bicycling, etc.

Recently, a contractual Parks Project Coordinator was hired specifically for the purpose of identifying potential development opportunities for the park.

The Town of Berlin is seeking an allocation of POS funds to enable the purchase of picnic tables, benches, bike racks, trash cans and other amenities to allow for passive use of the park. This project is the third priority.

4. JOHN HOWARD BURBAGE PARK: Named for Berlin's longest-serving Mayor, Burbage Park is a small "aesthetic" park located directly in front of the municipal Power Plant and Public Works campus. The Park is within two blocks of Berlin's downtown, on William Street, a main thoroughfare for both vehicle and pedestrian traffic and surrounded by residential neighborhoods and developments. Though long-named a park, the area has never truly been developed into an area for use by citizens or visitors. In 2009, the Town of Berlin, using Program Open Space funds, developed a Comprehensive Parks Plan that made a number of suggestions for the improvement and development of Burbage Park as a casual-use, as opposed to recreational, park.

The Berlin Parks Commission has recommended to the Mayor and Council that the concept put forth in the Comprehensive Park Plan be explored in depth. The first phase would be the development of design and specifications for improvement and the second phase would be development. Plans may include landscaping, reading "nooks" and other quiet activities. This project is the fourth priority.

THE EIGHT VISIONS:

The proposed projects are consistent with the Eight Visions in that:

- 1. Proposed additional park development will occur within or adjacent to areas already used for and/or suitable for park development.
- 2. No wetlands or other sensitive areas are being removed or infringed upon.
- 3. All projects are located on land owned and maintained by the Town and within the corporate limits of the Town. All areas are already in use as public parks in existing population centers.
- 4. No impact to the Chesapeake Bay and/or its tributaries will occur; all watershed from Berlin's parks drain to the coastal bays system.
- 5. No consumption of resources will take place and the land resources are being preserved by not allowing residential or commercial development.

- 6. By increasing the potential for recreational use of these areas, the potential for economic development will increase by offering more to attract visitors and new residents to the Town.
- 7. These areas currently have public infrastructure, including utilities and streets, either in service, or available for connection.
- 8. The Town allocates funds each year in its annual budget to the maintenance and development of our park areas. Additionally, the bond which was used for the purchase of Berlin Falls Park has \$500,000 available for environmental study, remediation, and other related park development needs.


